Just follow the golden safety rules to celebrate safe Deepavali.


Construction Updates

According to Vastushastra, the ghee or oil in a diya represents negativity in mind, while the wick represents the Atma or soul. You can clear negativity from your mind and soul by burning the diya. This makes room for pleasant thoughts to come in.

The placement of the diya and its significance

Whether you welcome positive or negative energies into your home depends upon where you place your diya.

- Light the first diya in your pooja room.
- Vastu associates the tulsi plant with Goddess Lakshmi. If you have a tulsi or holy basil plant, place diyas near it.
- If you do not own a tulsi plant, place diyas in your kitchen.
- Welcome wealth into your life, keep diyas facing north or northeast.
- To improve your health, position diyas facing east.
- Diyas kept near water containers can banish negativity, protect against diseases \ and increase wealth.
